
8th Annual Golf Tournament and "Soul of the Patch" Golf Exhibit

The Lucy Craft Laney Museum's 8th Annual Golf Tournament held this May was a huge success, reaching its highest number of players ever. The tournament paid tribute to the 60th anniversary of Augusta golfers John Elam, Clois Herndon, Raymond Jenkins and Dr. Harry Thompson who, with the aid of Attorney John Ruffin, desegregated the Augusta Municipal Golf course in 1964. The theme coincided with a three-month exhibit, "Soul of the Patch", which highlighted these trailblazers and other local African American golfers.



The exhibit was curated by Ramona Harriet, CEO of The Epochs: African Americans in Golf Traveling Indoor Exhibition, and The Epochs Tour: Celebrating African American Golf History. The evening prior to the tournament, a reception was held honoring these trailblazers. We were grateful for the participation of Mr. Herndon, his family, and the families of the other golfers.

Preserving the Golden Blocks History Through Art



Twiggs Street Statue Unveiling

The legacy of Augusta's blacks in medicine was recognized in May with the unveiling of "The Pillars of the Golden Blocks" statue at the Twiggs Street Circle Roundabout in Augusta's historic Golden Blocks District. The statue features physicians, Dr. Scipio S. Johnson, (1879-1940), Dr. George N. Stoney (1865-1926), dentist Dr. James E. Carter (1906-1993) and Irene E. Jackson (1928-2009), who trained at the Lamar School of Nursing, co-founded by Miss Lucy Craft Laney and Dr. Stoney. Local artist Ashley Gray designed and sculpted the statue which was inspired by the book *Segregated Doctoring: Black Physicians in Augusta, Georgia, 1902-1952*, written by Dr. Leslie J. Pollard, Sr. The Lucy Craft Laney Museum collaborated with the Greater Augusta Arts Council, Augusta Housing and Community Development, as well as a host of other local agencies. Mural Update: Arts and Entertainment in the Era of the Golden Blocks

Progress is being made on our latest mural: Arts and Entertainment in the Era of the Golden Blocks. It will feature prominent African American artists, locally, nationally and internationally renowned as well as venues known to promote arts and entertainment in Augusta. Theron Cartwright is the artist for the mural which is located at 12th and Laney-Walker Boulevard. The mural is phase Three of the Golden Blocks Public Art Project, a collaboration between The Greater Augusta Arts Council, The Lucy Craft Laney Museum of Black History and Conference Center, and Augusta Housing and Community Development. Phase One of the Golden Blocks Art Project was dedicated in November of 2019 and currently there are four murals and five sculptures that can be found along Laney-Walker Boulevard as a part of this project.

Summer Fun at The Museum - Something Old and Something New

Summer Camp

Our 2024 summer campers enjoyed a fun and adventurous time at the Lucy Craft Laney Museum. The students, grades first through fifth, learned sign language; saw various birds of prey; made arts and sewing projects; toured the museum and nearby historic sites; enjoyed princess parties; face painting; played game, and made veggie wraps and more. Sewing Sessions

For the first time ever, the Laney Museum offered sewing classes to youth and adults in the River Region. The classes sold-out within a few weeks of the initial announcement. Students, ranging from first-time sewers to those with moderate experience, made tote bags, pillows, eye masks and items of clothing. The classes were taught by Noel Corbin, Black Fashion Curator and University of Georgia Phd student, who was inspired after seeing a photo of a Haines Normal and Industrial Institute sewing class from the late 1800s. The Rotary Club of Augusta provided funding for the sewing sessions, allowing the museum to purchase necessary equipment and sewing items.










Women's Journaling Club
